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Dear Friends of DAAD Thailand,

A few days ago, I've had the chance to visit the wonderful Kingdom of Thailand and participated in celebrations commemorating 60 years of DAAD in Thailand. To me this is a very special occasion, as I've spent five years of my life teaching as a DAAD-Lektorin at Chiang Mai University. Therefore academic exchange with Thailand is very close to my heart and I am glad to see the successful development that our common endeavour has taken.

During a celebratory lecture at
Chulalongkorn University we talked a lot
about the first DAAD-Lektor, Dr. Georg
Heuser, who, in 1957, started teaching
there. But I've also learned a lot from a
very forward-looking head of the German
section, Dr. Thanakon Kaewwipat,
explaining the reform of curricula for
German keeping up with developments.
Globally the demand is shifting from
generalist knowledge of German language and literature towards more specific applications of German language.

At DAAD we envision Thailand as an education hub for South East Asia, reaching out to the neighbouring CLMV countries, building networks in the region together with European partners. Thailand has a number of excellent universities to take the lead in their specific fields of

research. New opportunities for collaboration have been discussed in the field of regional studies, information technology and engineering to name just a few.

On Sunday the Deputy Prime Minister of Thailand, Dr. Prajin Juntong addressed DAAD scholars and former Thai students in Germany at a reception commemorating 50 years of VTD alumni association and 60 years of DAAD. He underlined the utmost importance of education on the path towards Thailand 4.0. The development of study programmes in close cooperation with both the industry and top-level research is a key to have the highly skilled workforce needed within the framework of the fourth industrial revolution.

After 60 years of successful Thai-German partnership and friendship, DAAD is looking forward to fostering more common networks of excellent research and international exchange. This will be possible in a joint effort together with our partners like the Thailand Research Fund and regional organisations like SEAMEO or others.

Speaking for the German Academic Exchange Service, I do wish our countries a long and prosperous journey through academic collaboration!

DAAD Thailand celebrates its 60 years

His Excellency Peter Prügel, Ambassador of the Federal Republic of Germany to the Kingdom of Thailand invited Dr.

Dorthea Rüland Secretary-General of the German Academic Exchange Service and the five DAAD lecturers based in Thailand to his residency. During an informal dinner, a range of ideas was exchanged regarding the role of higher education in Thailand and the state of international exchange between Germany and the Kingdom. The Ambassador was accompanied by representatives of the cultural, the scientific and the commercial section demonstrating how deeply and widely



academic collaboration is integrated in Thai-German partnership.

Recent developments at the universities where DAAD lecturers are based were discussed, liked projects going on at King Mongkut's University of Technology North Bangkok, where the Thai German Graduate School of Engineering (TGGS) is offering Masters degrees in Engineering following academic programmes of one the best technical universities in Germany, the RWTH Aachen, or current changes in the focus of German studies across South East Asia. Another topic of discussion was the German-Thai Railway Partnership (GTRP) where universities join forces to handle the crosscutting challenges posed by modern day research and development in the railway sector.

General-Secretary visiting Thammasat University

The DAAD maintains a long-standing cooperation with Thammasat University, including support for German experts teaching at Thammasat, fellowships for researchers to facilitate Thai-German research projects and scholarships for students. In 2009 the German-Southeast Asian Center of Excellence for Public Policy and Good Governance (CPG) was established as an academic institute and think tank as well as a provider of advisory services and facilitator. Four universities are the backbone of the CPG: Thammasat University, Frankfurt Univer-



sity, Münster University, and Passau University.

Dr. Rüland was cordially welcomed in fluent German by Asst. Prof. Dr. Prinya Thaewanarumitkul, Vice Rector for Administration and Sustainability. Prof. Prinya discussed current developments at Thai universities with his guest including the importance of the freedom thought and the role of critical thinking in creating a society who is able to achieve the vision of Thailand 4.0.

Research in Germany: Science Lecture III

The third and final Science Lecture for 2017 was held at Chulalongkorn University under the topic of 60 years of DAAD and German Studies at Chulalongkorn University. The history of German Language and Literature in Thailand is indeed closely interwoven with the history of DAAD in Thailand.

However, today we reach far beyond German studies at CU, there are many exchange programmes between Thai and German universities, doctoral candidates from Thailand do their research in Germany and a German professor currently holds a fellowship in the Faculty of Arts.

Dr. Rüland was welcomed at the historic Mahachulalongkorn Building by Chulalongkorn University's President Prof. Bundhit Eua-arporn, who greeted about sixty participants and officially opened the lecture.

Dr. Rüland was invited for an informal dinner with colleagues from the German section at Chulalongkorn University. Afterwards an extraordinary meeting of the German section was held together with the Secretary-General. Concerns regarding the strategic re-positioning of German studies were discussed. DAAD and their lecturers sent to Thailand still play a crucial role in a subject that has diversified and professionalized remarkably during the past decades.

Alumni Forum

DAAD Thailand and Thai-German alumni association VTD hosted a celebratory alumni night at the Dusit Thani Hotel in Bangkok to commemorate 50 years of VTD and 60 years of DAAD in Thailand.

The event's topic was "Thailand 4.0 through the eyes of Germany Alumni" and we were very honoured to have the Deputy Prime Minister Prajin Juntong opening the event together with Dr. Rüland from DAAD, ACM Tares from NBTC, HE MR. Prügel from the German Embassy and AM Wirod from VTD.

After many discussions on the way forward for Thailand 4.0 and the importance of higher education along the way, Dr. Rüland seized the opportunity to ask students from neighbouring countries on stage to receive their scholarship certificates. These young scholars are supported by DAAD to study at selected centres of excellence in Thailand. Congratulations to all of them and thank you for making it such a memorable evening!

Scholarships for Summer Courses at German Universities

The DAAD supports the best university students in second and third year to participate in a four-week language course offered by German Universities in June/July/August 2018.

Who is eligible?

- Undergraduate students can apply during their second or third year. Students in Master programmes can only apply in their first year. The programme is open for students from all fields of studies.
- At the time of application students must prove German language proficiency on level B1.
 Applicants can take an OnSet-Deutsch exam organized by DAAD free of charge.

Scholarship

- One-off scholarship payment of 850 € plus 650 € of travel allowance
- Payments towards health, accident and personal liability insurance cover

Please note: Course fees and accommodation expenses will be deducted from scholarship payments so that the grant holder is paid "only" the difference to the full amount of the scholarship



Doing a doctorate in Germany

The German doctorate has one of the best reputations worldwide with more than 4,000 international graduates completing their doctorate in Germany every year. Structured PhD programmes frequently have a strong international focus with English being the team language.

There are two models to choose from when pursuing a PhD in Germany. You can choose either the traditional, individual route, or you may prefer the structured doctoral programmes. The traditional PhD model continues to be the most popular choice where you choose your research topic and write your thesis under the supervision of a professor. Structured doctoral programmes are similar to programmes in English-speaking countries where a team of supervisors look after a group of doctoral students. There is a fixed curriculum within which they work toward their doctorate and write their dissertation.

Guidelines

One of the most significant conditions to get accepted by a supervisor or in a doctoral programme is **to have a very good and convincing research proposal.**

For DAAD research scholarship applicants and those who would like to do your doctorate in Germany, in this newsletter, we have prepared the questions to help you with writing your research proposal/exposé.

How to write a research exposé?

In a research exposé, you define the goals of your research work, reflect upon the theoretical and methodical procedure and you describe the individual steps.

The objective

- · What is the content of your research project?
- Which steps are planned?
- How do you plan your work schedule?

The structure

The description (approx. 3 - 10 pages) should provide information about the following:

- 1 The research field in general and the current state of research literature:
- What is the current level of research?
- Which theories/work of other scientists do you refer to?
- Discussion of the theoretical framework or model
- What is your research question?
- 2 Key research questions (hypotheses), research objectives and the scientific relevance of your project:
- What do you intend finding out?
- What goals are you pursuing with your project?

3 Research strategies/methods:

- How do you intend answering the research questions?
- How do you want to collect data (document analyses, quantitative or qualitative survey, experiment, etc.)?
- Which scientific literature will you use?
- How will you evaluate results?
- What is your schedule?
- What preparation have you already done or intend doing before funding begins?

4 Ethical issues/anticipated difficulties collecting data

5 Provisional schedule (in tabular form)

 How much time do you need for the individual research phases (before, during and, if applicable, after the scholarship period)?

6 Research bibliography

• List of books and essays upon which your work is based.
